LEBANON (AP) — The last bit of water has been released from Williams Lake, satisfying a state law that required the draining but upsetting residents whose homes now border a gigantic mu-

It's a situation that could occur again in other parts of Connecticut, according to a state environ-

mental official.

"It was a gorgeous lake," said Bernyce Breena, who has looked out on the lake from a 24-foot-wide bedroom window. "It's so distressing. I don't know if you can imagine what it's like to live on a waterless lake."

The last drop of water from the 247-acre lake in rural, northeast Connecticut was drained on Thursday, and the dam that created the lake is likely to come down soon. Without the dam, the

lake can't exist.

"It's really a sad thing to look at; the water's all gone," said Jane LeRoy, who has lived on the lake's shore for eight years. "It's sad because it's a beautiful lake, especially in the fall. The sun shines through the trees and reflects off the wa-

Charles A. Sperlazza of Plainville was at the ke Thursday night when the last of the water s released. He and a friend spent three hours owing fish left behind in the mud into a nearby ook in hopes of saving them.

The dam is scheduled to come down because it in need of repairs, an expense that has figured

in the owners' decision. Legislation passed in 1983 has forced some dam owners to choose between maintaining their dams and abandoning them.

Of the 4,000 dams in the state, about 1,000 are privately owned and surrounded by homes, said Philip W. Moreschi, principal engineer with the Department of Environmental Protection's water resource unit.
